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HOME BUILDERS ANNOUNCE STATEWIDE "GREEN BUILDING" PROGRAM FOR SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENCES

EarthCraft House™ Program to be Broadly Introduced

RICHMOND, September 21, 2006

Governor Timothy M. Kaine today helped launch an initiative that provides Virginia homebuyers with a one-stop source for homes that save money on energy and utility bills, provide excellent indoor air quality, are durable, and feature environmentally friendly products.

With the introduction of the EarthCraft House Single Family Program, these certified energy efficient homes will become increasingly available in the Commonwealth. This program, which provides voluntary Green Building guidelines for builders in Virginia, is being launched as of September 21, 2006. Partners in the program include the Home Builders Association of Virginia (HBAV), Virginia Sustainable Building Network (VSBN) and Southface Energy Institute. Supporters of the program include the U. S. Department of Energy Building America Program; the Energy Division, Virginia Division of Mines, Minerals and Energy and additional private sponsors.

"I am pleased that Virginia homebuilders are eager to offer homes that lessen the negative impact on our environment," Governor Kaine said. "This initiative will teach homeowners, home builders, and commercial design and construction professionals ways they can save energy and water, and preserve our environment."

"The Home Builders Association of Virginia supports this program because EarthCraft House allows builders great flexibility in achieving environmental performance," said Anthony Clatterbuck, President of the HBAV. "Adoption of this program supports builders' ability to deliver homes that lessen their impact on the environment and provide homebuyers with independently inspected and certified homes that are high-performance, durable and resource-efficient."

The program rollout will be very aggressive to provide the public with EarthCraft homes statewide as quickly as possible. Initial areas for the program roll out this fall will include the Charlottesville area, working with the Blue Ridge Home Builders Association, and the Roanoke area, working with the Roanoke Regional Home Builders Association. A second tier of roll outs will take place in the Spring of 2007 and will include the Richmond and Southside areas, the New River Valley area, Shenandoah Valley, and the Peninsula home builders. The program will continue to be introduced into new markets each quarter until the entire state receives service.

VSBN will administer the EarthCraft House Single Family Program in Virginia, with Charles B. Bowles of The Energy Consortium serving as the program's technical advisor. To qualify for this program, a builder must be

a member of their local association, register with the national program, and complete a training course. Each new home is required to pass a final inspection before being certified as an EarthCraft House. The inspection is based on a flexible point system that requires a minimum of 150 points for a house to be certified in the following areas: site planning; energy efficient techniques and equipment; resource efficient design and materials; waste management; indoor air quality; water conservation; home buyer education; and builder operations.

Any size and type of new home can be an EarthCraft House. Builders and home buyers have the freedom to select which measures in the program checklist are best suited for the home they are constructing. The EarthCraft House Program promises to deliver to the Commonwealth a winning combination of utility cost savings, good craftsmanship and sensible environmental stewardship through an easily recognizable program.

The EarthCraft program is also available for multifamily housing in Virginia and is administered by EarthCraft Virginia, a non-profit subsidiary of the Virginia Community Development Corporation. Approximately 800 units in nineteen developments are in the process of obtaining EarthCraft Multifamily Certification, demonstrating that this effort will serve a variety of housing types and demographics. The Virginia Housing Development Authority (VHDA) has included EarthCraft as one of the approved programs for the multifamily housing developments financed by the Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program, which they administer for the Commonwealth.
