

Keynote Speakers (in speaking order)

Donald E. Sundgren, Chief Facilities Officer, Facilities Management Department University of Virginia

Donald Sundgren was named as Chief Facilities Officer at the University of Virginia in July 2006. Prior to this position, Mr. Sundgren spent more than 35 years in the construction industry. He left a position of president and northwest regional manager for Swinerton Builders, where he gained extensive experience in capital expenditures and working with multiple stake-holders in projects. He spent two years in the Army Corps of Engineers in Augsburg, Germany and taught basic and advanced courses to engineering officers in Ft. Belvoir, Virginia. Mr. Sundgren holds a bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering, with additional executive training at the University of Tennessee and Stanford University.

Jonathan Z. Cannon, J.D., Professor and Director, Environmental and Land Use Law Program University of Virginia

Jonathan Cannon, Director of the Law School's Environmental and Land Use Law Program, joined the Law School faculty in 1998 from the Environmental Protection Agency, where he served as general counsel (1995-98) and assistant administrator for administration and resources management (1992-95). Prior to his work with the EPA, Cannon was in the private practice of environmental law; served as an adjunct professor at Washington and Lee Law School, where he taught environmental law; and was a lecturer at the Law School.

Jonathan Cannon was involved with the recent Supreme Court decision regarding the U.S. EPA's authority to regulate Greenhouse Gases under the Clean Air Act. When he was the EPA's General Counsel, he was the author of a legal opinion concluding that the Agency had authority to regulate greenhouse gas emissions under existing provisions of the Clean Air Act. That opinion was reversed by a subsequent General Counsel. The issue of EPA's authority was joined in the recent Supreme Court case of *Massachusetts v. EPA*; the Court upheld Cannon's earlier interpretation of the Clean Air Act and directed EPA to reconsider its refusal to regulate greenhouse gas emissions for motor vehicles manufactured and sold in the U.S.

Julian Keniry, Senior Director, Youth and Campus Programs National Wildlife Federation

Julian Keniry is the senior director of the National Wildlife Federation's (NWF's) Youth and Campus Programs, is a cofounder of NWF's Campus Ecology Program. Since 1989, she has lectured to campus and other audiences across the United States and abroad on sustainability in higher education. She wrote *Ecodemia: Campus Environmental*

Stewardship at the Turn of the 21st Century (1995), co-authored *Green Investment, Green Return: How Practical Conservation Projects Save Million on America's Campuses* (Eagan and Keniry 1998), and spearheaded the *State of the Campus Environment: A National Report Card on Environmental Performance and Sustainability in Higher Education* (McIntosh et al. 2001). She currently serves on the board of the Institute for Conservation Leadership and as a member of an ad hoc sustainability committee of the Society for College and University Planning (SCUP).
